Local elections on May 4: You will need photo ID to be able to vote

The Government has ordered that voters in the local elections on May 4 must produce photo ID in order to place their X against their preferred candidate. This can be a passport, driving licence, Blue Badge or any official document bearing your photograph.

An out of date photo ID is permitted provided that it looks like you and your name is the same as that on your voter registration card.

If none of these is available the deadline for acquiring a Voter Authority Certificate is 5pm on April 25

Voting will take place for all wards on South Hams District Council, whose



leader Judy Pearce, one of the two councillors for our ward, is standing down. Two South Milton parish councillors are also retiring and applications to fill their places are sought. Contact the council clerk on south.milton@gmail.com


On the Monday, which has been declared a bank holiday, the Big Help Out will enable groups and individuals to carry out volunteer tasks in their communities.

Village residents have been taking advantage of the Climate and Nature Action Group's newly acquired thermal imaging camera in their bid to keep on top of their rising energy costs.

The camera has been funded by a grant from South Hams District Council and is operated by group members James Day and



Nick Townsend. It produces images like the one seen here, where the red spot clearly indicates a loss of heat area. The householder was able to plug this external gap with decorator's caulk bought for under a fiver.

The often relatively cheap cost of saving money on your fuel bill is a message being put across by the group.

cussed included air source heat pumps, solar panels and, a first for the village, an anaerobic digestion system.



be approached at low tide.


Rosemary Griggs (right) gave us An Audience with the Lady Katherine with a peep inside her wardrobe this month.

Improvements to track and boardwalk at South Milton Sands

The track behind the beach was repaired, and we will continue to monitor it with another refresh planned before Easter, or earlier if needed.

The contractors are booked to replace the top boardwalk, a long overdue job which will be a great improvement.

We have also secured funding from Defra and the South West Coast Path Association to replace the boardwalk from the car park with a more accessible one, as the current timbers are at the

end of their life. The new

structure will include an area at the end for wheelchairs to use as a viewing platform so visitors with limited mobility can also access this beautiful site.

We will be continuing with the archaeological digs this year, and have permission to work on Bolt Tail to further investigate the historic use of this site. Historic England will be leading this work and we look forward to updating you on the finds.

Volunteers were due to open up test pits through areas of the site in the last few days, and the county archaeologist, Bill Horner, was due to lead a guided
