As only one person stepped forward to join the council it was not necessary to hold an election on May 4.

It was also farewell time for district councillor Judy Pearce who, as one of the two South Hams ward members, has regularly attended SMPC meetings. Judy, who had been the Conservative leader of the district council, announced her retirement earlier in the year.

Mark Long (Independent), who has also been a regular attendee at parish council meetings, was re-elected for a further term on May 4 — a day that will be remembered for the public's rejection of around 1,000 Conservative councillors across England.

Many of Judy Pearce's erstwhile colleagues were shown the door as Liberal Democrats swept to power at Follaton House.

It is the first time since 1999 that the Conservatives have not been in control of SHDC. The make-up of the council now is: Liberal Democrats 19, Conservatives 7, Greens 3, Labour 1, Independent 1

In the poll for the Salcombe and Thurlestone ward, which includes South Milton, the result was: Mark Long (Ind) 1160, Samantha Dennis (Cons) 618, both elected; Jim Heaven (Cons) 513, Nikki Turton (Ind) 447, Lewis Worrall (Greens) 257, Alan Kerr (Lib Dems).

Caroline sets personal best time in London Marathon

All the hours spent pounding the roads and paths around South Milton and neighbouring villages paid off for Caroline Carroll when she set a new personal best time in the London Marathon last month. The Backshay Park runner covered the classic 26.2-mile course from Blackheath to The Mall in three hours 27 minutes and 53 seconds, more than five minutes better than her previous fastest time over the distance.

She was the 1366th woman to finish, and was among the first 8000 of the 45,000 starters to complete the course.
